With her heavy involvement in the Queer and Trans people of color (QTPOC) community it only made sense that she'd continue doing Queer work after graduating. Dafne's additional research interest include theintersections of Latinx communities and mental health, Chicana feminism and Theory, the politics of selfcare and self love, and Fat Studies.

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




